







NATIONAL WORKSHOP OF STAKEHOLDERS FOR THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE ACCESS TO INFORMATION LAW

CONTEXT

Organized jointly by the Office of the Minister of State for Administrative Reform (OMSAR), the Public Governance Directorate of the OECD, in the framework of the MENA-OECD Governance Programme and in cooperation with the United Nations Development Programme, it will bring together representatives of the Lebanese public administration, parliamentarians, civil society organisations, the media and private sector to consult on the draft national action plan for the implementation of the access to information law.

Following a participatory process that was led by Parliamentarians against Corruption and OMSAR, Lebanon adopted law number 28 in 2017 to guarantee the right of access to information (ATI). The effective implementation of this law requires the establishment of related procedures, frameworks and tools, a change of culture within the various institutions, covered by the law (e.g. ministries, public institutions, municipalities, courts, private companies managing public services, etc.), as well as adequate take up by citizens and civil society. The implementation of ATI law is recognised within the draft National Anti-Corruption Strategy as a pillar for transparency and accountability and one of the key outputs of its implementation plan. The implementation of the law furthermore contributes to the achievements of UNCAC Articles 10 and 13 and SDG especially SDG 16. It will also support Lebanon in its efforts to adhere to the OECD Recommendation on Open Government and to become a member of the Open Government Partnership (OGP).

As such, the Office of the Minister of State for Administrative Reform (OMSAR), in cooperation with UNDP and the OECD, is developing a National Action Plan for the implementation of the access to information law. The plan will be developed in an inclusive manner, providing a comprehensive framework for the implementation of the law, with coherent commitments and activities from a wide range of stakeholders including the public administration, parliamentarians, civil society, media, and the private sector. It will thereby create a common vision, ensure synergies between different actors and their commitments and provide a roadmap for the successful implementation of the law.

The process is led by an Access to Information Committee established by OMSAR as a sub-committee of the Technical Committee on Anti-Corruption that supports the Ministerial Committee. Following a first round of consultative meetings, this workshop aims to present the draft action plan to all relevant stakeholders in order to collect their input and feedback. Subsequently it will be adopted by the Ministerial Anti-Corruption Committee. The plan will pave the way for the implementation of several actions, supported by Lebanese and international actors.
