Financial Aid at ULS

- Needs Based financial Aid
- Merit-based scholarships
- Grants from foreign partners
- Work-study programs
- Tuition waivers



Corruption Risks in Financial Aid

a. Eligibility Fraud

- Misrepresentation of income or academic records by applicants.
- Collusion with insiders to manipulate eligibility criteria.

b. Favoritism and Nepotism

- Aid awarded based on personal connections, not merit or need.
- c. Bribery and Kickbacks
- Staff accepting bribes for granting aid or speeding up processes.
- d. Ghost Students or Phantom Beneficiaries
- Aid awarded to non-existent students or diverted to false accounts.
- e. Misallocation of Funds
- Funds not reaching intended recipients due to poor oversight



Example 1: Financial Aid Policy

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6.1.2. Financial Aid Eligibility

In order to be eligible for financial aid, a student needs to fulfill the following conditions:

- Must have dully submitted his/her application and all supporting documents.
- Must be enrolled or accepted on a substantially full-time basis².
- Must demonstrate financial need and submit supporting documents.
- Must be in good academic standing³. For incoming students this criterion does not apply for the first semester.

• Must be in good conduct standing⁴.

Good Academic Standing

Good Conduct Standing

refers to undergraduate student with cumulative GPA \geq 2.0; graduate student with cumulative GPA \geq 3.0.

refers to student who did not receive disciplinary sanctions for contravening the ULS Code of Conduct.

| Prodigy Achievement Scholarship | Incoming students based on their performance in high school and/or at the Lebanese Baccalaureate or its equivalent degrees. | | | |
| Third Party Scholarships | Third parties willing to offer scholarships targeting specific audiences | | Third Party | MoU |
